and after school programmes. There is some evidence that disadvantaged pupils benefit more, making closer to three months' additional progress. There are also often wider benefits for low-income students, such as increased attendance at school, improved behaviour, and better relationships with peers.

Disadvantaged pupils have access to a full range of behaviour and emotional support, this will be delivered by the Learning Mentor, external pastoral specialists (Increase the Peace, Child Behaviour Solutions, Ben Bishop) and the Family Support Advisor. Targeted pupils will also receive Play Therapy, Art Therapy to help them address emotional issues, previous trauma and enable the pupils to feel settled and ready to learn. Pupils in receipt of this support will be closely monitored through the use of ELSA Baseline assessments and reviewed at the end of the episode of support to analyse impact. These will be delivered over a half term, and impact will be shared with parents and class teachers. Where little impact is evident, the support will be reviewed and alternatives sort.

In-school Emotion Coaching Lead will deliver further training to all staff, to align with the schools newly developed Behaviour Policy (Spring Term). This effective approach will help support pupils to self-regulate and manage their stress responses.

Funding of in-school experiences for targeted opportunities-Residential and alternative experiences which build resilience, confidence and self-esteem, such as circus skill days, theatre trips etc. These will be organised during the Summer Term once Government Guidance indicates that Covid Measures can include this type of experience.

During Autumn Term 2, EYFS and Y1 will experience Forest School with a Forest School qualified Lead. These year groups have been targeted due to the need for pupils to increase and demonstrate their independence, as well as support the emotional impact of Covid and the reduction of outdoor play.

Remote Learning opportunities are considerate of technological needs for disadvantaged pupils. The Inclusion Lead will investigate possibility of individual subscriptions to online Museum/gallery/theatre access. Bug Club online reading subscription purchased for EYFS and KS1, to target Early Readers, and enable all pupils have access to a wide range of texts which are specifically matched according to their ability.

Targeted SEMH interventions planned for and delivered by additional adults. SEMH baseline assessments undertaken at the beginning of each intervention to monitor impact.

#### Priority 2:

Attendance for disadvantage pupils is at least 96%

Parenting Classes to be delivered online via TEAMS by the Family Support Advisor. This will enable families who are on the waitlist for Early Help to receive support quickly, and address the needs within the home.

The pastoral team will meet weekly to share ideas, support and signpost, which will in turn make sure families receives the appropriate support within the home.

Additional school funded places the Breakfast and Afterschool Club will be allocated on a needs basis. For families with

	transport difficulties, this will enable they are not having to wait for a length amount of time at the beginning/end of the school day. The hope is that this will create a more positive attitude and improved mind-set towards learning and view of the school. This will also increase attendance.
